

tain task, it usually doesn't get done. There is always enough to do with visiting or meetings or other activities that if I don't keep to my list, certain less demanding, but just as important tasks are forgotten.

The same thing can happen to any Christian. There are so many demands upon us that we may put aside those needed activities that don't seem so demanding. If we miss a Sunday at church, God won't show up and threaten to fire us as if we missed a day on the job. If we don't take time for the family of God, they won't keep nagging at you like some might when they want you to do something for them. If you don't get to your daily devotions, your faith won't immediately be lost, will it?

In the short run, it seems that with all the demands on life, that those that come from God can always be added to next week's list. But we find that the more we put off God's requests today, the more we will be lost tomorrow. If we don't share the values given to us by God with our children, we have only ourselves to blame when they don't share those values with their children. If we don't take time to share in Christ's ministry to others, chances are that it will not be there to be shared with us when we need it. If we don't take time to be nourished and strengthened by God, His strength will not be there when we need it the most.

As we start a new church year, please take time to list what is really important in your life and the life of your family. I firmly believe that God should be at the top of your list. I also firmly believe that you are on God's list of people to be with this week.



WILL THERE BE A 5TH QUARTER IN 2019?



"Dear friends in Christ, brothers and sisters, I am, as I shared last evening, honored to be standing here and humbled by the decision that's just been made," Bishop Selbo said following the announcement of his election.

"I am hearing and accepting this as a call not only from Christ and His Church but from God Himself," he said. "I want you to remember this day because if this works out, it is evidence that the Holy Spirit has been at work. And if it does not, this was your vote,"

he added with a smile. "The theme, 'Walking by the Spirit with the Fruit of the Spirit,' this does not work without Jesus. Apart from Christ, it just has no future and hope. But, in Him and with Him and by His power, there is a lot of work to be done and this is a body through which

God will work to carry out His purposes in this world.



HOMELESS IN INDIANAPOLIS

(Pastor's Report on the N.A.L.C. Convocation)

My week at the N.A.L.C. Convocation found me homeless and a bit frustrated. The reservations that I had booked for me and Pastor Lundeen had disappeared somewhere between Erskine and Indianapolis and the motel's reservation center somewhere in the world. I had cancelled my first booking so that I could share a room with Pastor Lundeen, but then had re-booked for the both of us. I had a cancellation number given to me and a new reservation number, but when I presented myself on Tuesday, I was told that the cancellation number was correct, but the other number was also a cancellation number for the room that I had not booked. The inn was full and the next inn was full and the next inn was full and the next inn was full. I think the clerk realized my quiet anger. With the help of the clerk, I finally found a room (a bit farther away and a bit more expensive) so I was no longer homeless. At least this helped me get my daily exercise each day.

The lectures were O.K. (though one was excellent) on the Holy Spirit and the Lutheran Church. There was sharing of what our church is doing and our partner churches throughout the world. There was Bible Study and worship and time to talk with other Christian brothers and sister in our denomination. The business part of the meeting included the election of our new bishop. (See the article elsewhere in the newsletter.) And the rest of the business meeting was necessary



though not necessarily exciting.

As I left for home, I realized two things. Our denomination had matured and the focus on Christ and discipleship is no longer new and exciting, but the way the church needs to be to stay faithful to the mission given to us. The second thing I realized was that I was not angry. In the last years of my service in the E.L.C.A., I left such meetings frustrated, depressed, but mostly angry at the failure and direction of the denomination. In the N.A.L.C., I left with hope and excitement, but mostly with satisfaction, that we are faithfully following the work of our Savior. Without drama and debate, we are doing the work of Christ and walking in the Holy Spirit that He gave us.



Describe how you experience God active in your daily life.

My experience of God's activity in my life is directly related to the priority I give to the relationship He has established with me in His cross and in my Baptism. On days when my relationship with Christ is central, giving Him the time and the place in my life He deserves, I see His hand at work in many ways. In contrast, when my relationship with Him gets set aside and I busy myself with other priorities, even though He is still actively

at work, my experience of His activity is not the same.

Personally, I experience God opening and closing doors in response to specific prayers I offer. He provides opportunity, on a daily basis, for witnessing to people I had not on my own even considered. He strengthens the relationships I have at work. He grows and develops the partnership I share with other sisters and brothers in the Church. He strengthens and increases the love I have for my wife and family.

He also, on an even more personal level, enables me to grow in my individual relationship with Christ. Through His Holy Spirit, He strengthens my faith, provides an assurance and a peace that I know come from Him, and gives me the gifts and insights and wisdom I need to live each day as a follower of Jesus. The more disciplined I am in making time to spend with my Lord, the more fully I realize and recognize His daily activity in my life.

In my role as a pastor, the same relationship-driven principle has proven to be true. Having had the joy and privilege of serving for more than 30 years in a Word and Sacrament ministry, I have seen God actively at work in the lives of countless people. The power of His Word, faithfully preached and taught, and His life-giving presence in the Sacraments, regularly and properly administered, have had an eternal impact on the lives of hundreds, if not thousands, of people I have served and for whom our Lord died.

Particularly, over the past eight years, since the time our congregation made a conscious and deliber-

ate decision to move away from being a program-driven ministry to becoming a disciple-making ministry, I have seen God's Spirit at work in transforming lives in ways I would never have imagined. Regardless of how long they have been connected to the church, the same life-transforming work is taking place. Regular Sunday morning attenders are being transformed into faithful and committed followers of Christ. People who used to volunteer their time because of their membership in the church are now serving in ministries because they have fallen in love with their risen Lord. Vocations in life are being viewed not only as a means of earning a living to support their families, but as an opportunity for living out their faith as members in God's family. Priorities are different. Life's purpose is not the same. The definition of success has dramatically changed. God is at work, through His Holy Spirit, to grow and transform lives into the shape and image of Christ.

I have seen it happen in the lives of congregational members as they have committed themselves to worship and opened themselves to a new and a living relationship with Jesus. I have experienced it in my own life as I give priority to the disciplines of the Christian life and to the relationship God has established with me in His Son. I know it works. I have seen it happen. I experience it on a daily basis. God is active and faithful in His promises as we open our lives to His guiding and life-changing presence.









Treasurer's Report:

Cash Flow Report

- Undesignated funds available to be used for July's General Fund expenses totaled \$12,220.35. July's General Fund expenses totaled \$12,653.72.
- Congregational giving to the General Fund was \$12,191.74. The monthly budget goal is \$17,651.60.
- Noteworthy Other Giving –
- o Oil Leases Only monthly payment from Cont. Oil Co. included in July income since the Oasis Oil payment came early at the end of June, so it was included in June's revenue.

Some of the noteworthy expenses this month included:

Administration – NALC Convocation Offering – Donation at national gathering in Indianapolis in August.

Postage – Includes the renewal of the bulk mailing permit (\$235), stamps for Jim (\$55), and postage for the church office (\$73).

Budget Report

• We ended the month at approximately 13% or \$28,200 under budget.

All of the major budgeted expense categories ended under budget for the month.

History of Regular Giving to the General Fund Report

- July had the fourth highest giving in 2019 to date.
- July 2019 had the fifth highest giving for a July in 9 years.

Year-to-date total is behind last year at this time by approximately \$8,000; and is the lowest at this point since 2015.

History of the General Fund Balance

- All month ends in 2019 to date have been negative.
- This is the second highest negative balance for 2019 to date.
- There has not been a positive month end balance since September 2018.
- All July's have ended in a negative balance except 2 in 9 years.
- July 2019 had the highest negative balance for any July in 9 years.

2014 was similar to 2019 in that the first 7 months of the year all ended with negative balances. That year turned around in August and had 5 positive months and ended with a positive balance. However, only one of those negative balances in the first 7 months of 2014 were higher than the ones in 2019.

Account Balances Report

- Building Fund Reflects the month's donations and the monthly payment for the separate phone line in the elevator. Activity also included materials to fix the roof on the education wing and purchase a new door lock.
- Oil Fund Bldg Upkeep reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue and the purchase of a \$20,000 CD.
