Much, but not all, of what I write this month was shared during worship on November 15th. You are not crazy if you think you have heard some of these thoughts before but I ask that you do read the entire article to ensure you receive the full intended update.

We have paused our plan to offer an in-person worship option. All of the other conditions previously laid out had been met, we were just waiting for heat. While we were waiting, we ran into the caveat of a local COVID outbreak. Polk County has some of the highest virus activity in the state right now. Once that activity subsides, we will move forward with offering the inperson worship option. I want the congregation to know how seriously your elected Church Council takes this and all other decisions that come before it. The Council has faithfully met monthly with offering in-person worship as a standing agenda item. Month after month we discuss the situation in depth. We reflect on our mission to share God's Word. We talk about the fact that Jesus taught us to love one another. We worry about the fact that we can be losing connection with some of our members. We know some people aren't hearing God's Word through our church. All these things and more are considered every month. There is no instruction manual for making the decisions that come before the Council. I hope all members take that into account as we navigate this time and you express your gratitude to those willing to serve on the Council.

Speaking of those willing to serve, I also ask that you express gratitude and offer prayers to the members of our Call Committee. These folks accepted a tough job that has been made much tougher due to the pandemic. We have activity happening right now that is very exciting. We anxiously wait to see how the Holy Spirit stirs us in the coming weeks.

Christmas is rapidly approaching. I'm sure many in our congregation are wondering about Christmas Eve. No matter where we are at with an in-person option for worship by then, we will not be able to have 250-300 sitting shoulder to shoulder singing hymns. Knowing that, we are working on a plan to broadcast a service online and on GVTV at 4:30 pm on Christmas Eve. The service will consist of new readings and teaching that will be mixed with hymns from a previous Candlelight Service. More details to come.

I know it may seem like I ask you for a lot but I am going to ask for just a little more. I ask that you consider the wonderful things that continue to happen at our church.







Is it Important to Know Jesus' Family Tree at Christmas?



Establishing Jesus' family tree confirms the prophecy that Jesus would be a direct descendent of Bible patriarchs and heroes and, therefore, the long-awaited Messiah. The gospels, which list Jesus' family line, were written by two scholarly men: Matthew and Luke.

Matthew and Luke provided different genealogies for Christ in their gospels — does that matter? Today, Christians think less about the past and more about eternity to come, so is Christ's family tree important to our celebration of his birth?

If these learned men did not fully agree about Jesus' lineage, how does this impact our view of other facts surrounding the birth of our Savior, such as the virgin birth?

Prophecies of Christmas

While Easter is the most important day in the Christian calendar, Christmas is a time to give gifts in recognition of the ultimate gift, given to the world freely by God through his Son—salvation for all who believe in

Jesus as their Savior.

If the Bible is true, then Christmas was not established around a fairy tale. Christians are commemorating a historical event, even though the date was not recorded; unsurprising, since most poor people could not read or write.

Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds were certainly poor. The record of Jesus' birth comes from fulfilled prophecies; future facts already written down, including:

Christ would be born of a virgin (Isaiah 7:14).

He would be born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2).

He would be descended from King David (Jeremiah 23:5; Isaiah 11:1).

The fulfillment of these detailed prophecies contributes to a believer's confidence that Jesus was indeed *the* Son of God.

The second and third of this trio of prophecies are easy to believe and to prove, but the first is a different matter.

Trusting the Prophets

"The Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14).

"Without the virgin birth, there would be no salvation for sinners. Jesus Christ would be a sinful human being. If the virgin birth did not occur, then the Bible is not true and cannot be trusted. In short, it is an essential

part of salvation and of Scripture."

If Mary was not a virgin, Christmas as "Christ's Mass" is nothing but a fanciful story. Of all the statements in the Bible, Mary's virginity is one of the most difficult for readers to accept and believe.

Yet, if more mainstream particulars can be corroborated, Christians can trust the prophets and, by association, the Bible as a whole.

Among the many biblical prophecies regarding the long-awaited Messiah are references to his family tree. The Savior would emerge from "the line of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob."

Stephen J. Cole puts it this way: "It makes sense, if your money and future security are at stake, to have some good reasons to trust the person giving you advice. [...] It makes even more sense to be sure about the credentials of one to whom you entrust your eternal destiny as your Savior from God's judgment."

Establishing Jesus' family tree confirms the prophecy that Jesus would be a direct descendent of Bible patriarchs and heroes. The gospels, which list Jesus' family line, were written by two scholarly men: One who gave up a wealthy and privileged lifestyle as a tax collector to follow Christ; the other a Gentile who had nothing to lose and no ethnic case to prove.



4 Profound Lessons from the Wise Men on Seeking Christmas Joy

Is it worth it?

Christmas takes a lot out of us—the frenzied activity and financial strain, rushed trips, travel arrangements, credit card receipts, extra calories, jangled nerves.

Why does Christmas leave so many people exhausted and often depressed?

If that's what Christmas does to you, perhaps something's missing from your festivities.

There's an emptiness in our culture that cries out for the joy of Christmas but seems incapable of receiving it. Somehow the bows, mistletoe, sugar cookies, and jingle bells no longer satisfy the heart.

There isn't anything wrong with the original Christmas message, of course. The "good tidings of great joy" are as special now as then. The story of the Christ child—God-made man—is fully capable of satisfying the deepest needs of the human heart.

The problem is the human heart itself. Perhaps we can understand it better by looking at those curious characters in the Christmas story—the Wise Men. #1: Don't Count on Affluence

The first thing we notice about them is their wealth. They appeared to have all the possessions one could imagine. While we don't know if they were really kings, we do know they were wealthy enough to embark on long international trips, gain access to powerful rulers, and to bestow expensive presents. They are pictured on Christmas cards dressed in regal, royal garments, a caravan of camels in tow. Yet despite their riches, they were still searching for something money couldn't buy. Think of it. They were willing to leave their comfortable lifestyles and affluent palaces with wellwatered gardens by the Tigris and Euphrates Rivers to trek across a vast, barren desert in search of something that would fill the inner cravings of their souls.

Nothing has changed.
Many people work all their lives to develop a comfortable lifestyle only to find it strangely empty. Novelist Kathe Koja spoke of a "deep hole in the heart that cries for radiance." During an interview, she said, "Our entire consumer culture is predicated on the belief that if you stuff enough things down that hole, you can finally satisfy it into silence. But this has never been the case."

Lots of people give and receive hundreds of dollars' worth of gifts during Christmas, only to be depressed on December 26. As one old Puritan put it, "The world is fading, not filling."
#2: Don't Count on Family Ties

The Magi descended from powerful families, but that didn't satisfy them. Many experts believe the Magi were the descendants of the Babylonian wise men of biblical times, the people today known as the Kurds.

We first read of them in Daniel 2. The Babylonian King, Nebuchadnezzar, had a disturbing dream which none of his wise men—or Magi—could interpret. In a fit of wrath, Nebuchadnezzar ordered them all slain. But a young Hebrew prophet named Daniel intervened. God revealed to him the dream, and he explained it to the king. Daniel 2:48 says that Nebuchadnezzar "promoted Daniel and . . . made him . . . chief administrator over all the wise men of Babylon."

It was undoubtedly Daniel's influence that planted the seeds of Messianic hope within the Magi. The Old Testament is full of predictions of His coming, and the Magi apparently knew some of those promises. They began looking for a Hebrew Messiah, the coming "King of the Jews." Not having the full Hebrew Scriptures, the Magi looked for Him in the only place they knew—in the heavens, for they were astronomers. Rumors and yearnings for a coming King were passed from generation to generation until finally, hundreds of years later, they saw His star in the east and came to worship Him.

These men had a rich background,

and their lineage gave them a high place in society. But it meant little to them. They needed the King of the Jews. Perhaps you're proud of your background, of your family history and genealogy. Maybe you were raised in a Christian home. Perhaps you grew up in church. Or maybe you're proud of what you've achieved and of the name you've made for yourself. It's important to be thankful for our heritage and blessings; however, heritage and history don't satisfy the heart, and the name we make for ourselves will one day be forgotten. But those who find Jesus have eternal hope springing up in their hearts. Nothing compares to that.

#3: Don't Count on Influence

The Magi were also powerful, influential men. Matthew 2 says their presence in Jerusalem deeply troubled King Herod and all the city. Their questions created panic in the palace. From that, we can safely assume they were accustomed to visiting with kings and dignitaries. They didn't mind causing a stir. They were a respected group of leaders whose lifted eyebrow or ominous question could upset an entire nation. But they were still hungry of heart.

The great Israeli statesman Abba Eban wrote in his autobiography about a conversation he once had with Edmund Hillary, the first man to climb Mount Everest. Eban asked Hillary what exactly he felt when he reached the peak.

Hillary replied that the first sentiment was one of ecstatic accomplishment. But then there came a sense of desolation. What was there now left to do? Jack Higgins, the renowned novelist, said that the one thing he learned at the high point in his career that he wished he had known as a small boy is this: "When you get to the top, there's nothing there." People need the Lord. It isn't power and influence we need it's Christ Himself. It's a personal relationship with that Babe in

the Manger.

Finally, the Magi were religious men. They were, in fact, religious leaders. We call them "Wise Men" because they possessed the secrets of the mystery religions of the Orient, secrets handed down from the times of Daniel. Men and women throughout the eastern empires came to them, seeking answers to the questions of life. But despite their piety and religion, these men had hollow hearts and empty souls. And so they left home on their unexplainable mission, tramping through the desert, traveling for up to two years, trekking over "field and fountain, moor and mountain, following yonder star."

O star of wonder, star of light, Star with royal beauty bright, Westward leading, still proceeding,

Guide us to thy perfect light. They came to Christ.

Their journey ended in Bethlehem where they found at last the real <u>Christmas</u>. Where wealth, heritage, power, and religion failed, there they found the Prince of Peace.

"And when they had come into the house, they saw the young Child with Mary His mother, and fell down and worshiped Him. And when they had opened their treasures, they presented gifts to Him: gold, frankincense, and myrrh." (Matthew 2:11)

In Dorothy Sayers' play, *The Man Born to Be King*, one of the wise men says, "Fear is our daily companion—fear of want, fear of war, fear of cruel death and still more cruel life. But all this we could bear if we knew that we did not suffer in vain. If we knew that God was beside us in the struggle, sharing the miseries of His own world."

Do you feel that way? With all your affluence, family, influence, or traditions, are you still weary of heart this Christmas? Are you caught up in the boxes and bows, but somehow missing the Baby? The Magi of two thousand years ago were willing to leave everything behind if only they might find Him who had been born a King.

Are you willing to leave everything to find and follow Christ? To take Him into your heart and home?

Then I have good tidings of great joy! Unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior who is Christ the Lord.

Do you already know Christ? Then be a star this Christmas. Just as the mysterious light of the East guided the Wise Men to Christ, we can guide others to the manger. We can invite them to Christmas services where the gospel is presented. We can bestow gifts of Christian literature and music. We can share Jesus by love, lip, and literature, being "children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation, in which you shine like stars in the universe as you hold out the word of life" (Philippians 2:15-16, NIV).

Let this be your mission this Christmas. And let Christ be your Guide.

JESUS' FAMILY TREE, con't.

He followed Jesus because he *believed* on the basis of what he *learned*. One might imagine a doctor dismissing claims of a virgin pregnancy, but something convinced him. Christ's family tree might have played a part.

Two Trees, One Messiah

A skeptic might argue that, since Matthew's and Luke's genealogies differ, we must throw out Jesus' family tree as evidence of his divinity, thus undermining the reliability of biblical prophecy in every respect.

Possible answers to the problem exist, the most plausible of which is that Matthew traces Joseph's family tree and Luke traces Mary's. Cole alludes to other possible answers but admits "we can't know for sure which solution is correct."

Dr. Doug Bookman offers a plausible solution: The two gospels might have differed because one was concerned with "Christ's legal descent," or his legal right to be King, while the other describes "the physical genealogy of Jesus." Matthew leaves out some names, and Luke might be following "another branch."

"While Matthew focuses on Jesus being the Messiah and King of Israel by tracing His genealogy back through David to Abraham, Luke has a different purpose. He wants to show that Jesus is the unique Son of Man and Son of God, Savior of all people."

One reason Bible scholars trust Jewish genealogical records is that Jews, "especially [...] families who were in the Davidic line," were excellent record keepers "since the Old Testament prophesied that Messiah would be born of the house of David." Matthew was a Jew.

Yet, even though Luke was a Gentile, he (like Matthew) required the ability to think in a linear, organized fashion — Luke as a physician and Matthew as a tax collector. Record-keeping was essential to both men's professions.

And if they were lying, to what end? Matthew would have heard Jesus warn "they will lay their hands on you and persecute you, delivering you up to the synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors for my name's sake" (Luke 21:12).

Christians did not prosper for their faith in any earthly sense. Luke and Matthew conducted independent research and independently reached the conclusion that Jesus is Savior. We know for sure that Jesus is "the only candidate for Messiah" and "the only qualified Savior of the human race."

In spite of the genealogical differences, both Matthew and Luke emphasize two important facts which are essential to the Christian faith: Joseph was not Christ's biological father, and Mary was a virgin when she gave birth to the Son of God.

While these details seem obvious to today's Christian audience, they inspired awe and hope for Jews longing for the Messiah to come.

A Christmas Conviction

Christians celebrate the hope symbolized by Christmas: If we can trust that God kept his promise with the birth of Christ, we can also believe in the promise of eternity with our King when Jesus returns. Israel had placed their hope of salvation in God's prophesied Savior.

His birth was pivotal for all people of every nation — heredity no longer mattered. Thanks to the gospel, genuine believers worldwide can claim a place in Jesus' family. Jesus pointed to all of his followers and said, "Here are my mother and my brothers" (Mark 3:34).

The names within Luke's and Matthew's genealogies are less important to Christians today than the *faith* demonstrated by Old Testament forefathers, and then by Christ's disciples.

Likewise, the testimony of each believer today — their legacy of faith — is a gift, which comes from Immanuel himself, and that is worth celebrating each December 25.

It is that time again for myself and the Trustees to get together to work out the budget for next year. We will be doing that sometime before the next Council meeting in order to have it ready for discussion at the December meeting. If you have any thoughts with regard to next year's budget, please share them with myself or the Trustees so we can consider them when developing next year's budget.

Ashley Gagner of Ameripride presented investment information. Much of the investment decisions depends upon our projected needs.

Background of Brovold gift

Alvin originally worked with Reagan as his broker, who has since retired. Ashley has taken over this account.

Interest rates have decreased since the onset of this account. Prior to 2014, our account was primarily invested in oil and gas. After 2014, the oil prices dumped due to OPEC and overseas behaviors.

Where we are today

Why move from Wells Fargo to Ameripride? Ashley left Wells Fargo due to corporate control issues that she was not comfortable with. Wells Fargo had a great deal of employee turnover. Ameripride's culture had a veteran staff. Ashley felt that this too was a good sign of stability and a positive for joining Ameripride.

Information Folder (on file)

Page 1 reference. Equities can be stocks and/or bonds. Right side represents the fixed income side. This represents investment with less risk giving a consistent return. Ashley recommends that we try to get to a 50/50 split representing stocks and fixed return bonds. Alvin's goal was for us to use the growth amount and not the principal. He did not set his wishes into stone and we do have some options if we needed it, but we want to stay as true to his plan as possible. NUVEEN page 2.25 percent is the current interest, but due to their investment plan they are paying 5%. They are investing in a collection of tax free mutual funds. NUVEEN looks for bonds that aren't necessarily the bonds that are considered pristine (most costly), but they are looking for a medium road type of bond that has a solid return guaranteed. Mutual fund chart page Shows the bond side of things and that we are receiving a dividend of about 5%. Currently we are earning about 3 ½ % on the Brovold investment. It's important that we are socially responsible with our investments.


