Running the Race Summer Bible Reading Plans

Staying connected and remaining in God's Word can be surprisingly tough in the summer. People's lives and schedules are busy, and church attendance is often lower during summer months. Between family travel plans and other obligations, the summer months can seem just as busy — or even busier — than the rest of the year.

Although almost everyone has easy access to the Bible these days – it's available on our phones, on computers and, of course, in physical form – many Christians struggle with maintaining the daily habit of reading God's Word. Reading the Bible is a great way to remain in God's Word and to set aside time for him and your faith development throughout the summer.

Instead of a 30 day reading program, we opted instead to create one that's 26.2 days long – to match the distance number in a marathon! This also allows for a few grace days within the month or during the summer weeks.

Summer Bible Reading Plan for Children

We've selected Bible verses from both the Old Testament and New Testament books, including Bible verses from Deuteronomy, Psalm, Proverbs, John, Acts and Hebrews. These Scripture verses are simple and easy to read, and they take kids on a journey through the Bible while revealing the great big-picture story of Running the Race as a Christian. Children can use this Summer Reading Plan to build spiritual strength by growing closer to Jesus, God's Son.

The children's Bible Reading Plan consists of 27 different reading squares. Each square lists a small section of Scripture to read and then provides a question, activity or prayer that corresponds with that Bible verse or passage.

To get started, choose your reading pace with your child or children. Younger kids may need a slower pace than older kids, so be sure to pick a pace that works best for your family's specific needs. Kids can complete one square each day or every other day (or even once a week, if you wish to spread out the Bible Reading Plan further than just over the summer).

Next, choose which Bible version you wish to read from. We recommend NIV (New International Version) or ESV (English Standard Version) for children, which is a slightly easier Bible translation for readers of all ages to understand in plain English.

Finally, after deciding on your pace and Bible version, set aside a consistent time to complete your run through these Scriptures each day or week. Set an alarm on your phone or even schedule regular "appointments" with God in your calendar.

When each child reaches the finish line, they can start over again for more practice. If you plan to repeat the Bible Reading Plan a few times during the summer, try choosing a different translation each time!

You can even invite a friend or family member to take the joyful journey with you.

Summer Bible Reading Plan for Adults

In this reading plan, you will journey through significant chunks of several New Testament Epistle books this summer. After reading the suggested Scripture passage that is listed on each square, you can complete the question, activity or prayer that is also provided. This combination of themed resources will help you faithfully train in your run as a follower of Jesus.

First, set your individual pace. You may choose to complete one square each day or every other day. Just keep in mind your other plans for the summer and consider what is reasonable to achieve.

Once you've set your pace, next choose which Bible translation to read from. You might even want to challenge yourself to go through this Bible Reading Plan three times this summer, each time using a different Bible translation.

After choosing your pace and Bible version, next set a dedicated time in your day to do your reading and "running." This may be early each morning with a cup of coffee or tea before the busy day begins. Or evenings may work better for you, as you unwind your mind and refresh your soul before heading to bed. To create a good, lasting habit, it is always best to choose a certain time, schedule it in your calendar and then remind yourself to stick with it.

Call to Order: President Jason called the meeting to order.

Devotions: Jason based devotions on "Opportunities". "A favorable moment in time when good things can happen". Our God is an "opportunity giving" God. Seeing opportunities and seizing them is our challenge. (Ephesians 5:15-17). Seizing opportunities requires faith and action.

Approve Agenda:

Motion to approve the agenda by Gary. Seconded by Wade. Motion carried.

Secretary's Report:

Lori moved to approve minutes. Seconded by Nick. Motion carried.

Financial Secretary's Report:

Yvonne moved to approve. Seconded by Ann. Motion carried. (Report on file).

Treasurer's Report: Cash Flow Report

- Undesignated funds available to be used for April's General Fund expenses totaled \$14,100.59. This amount exceeded the month's General Fund expenses totaling \$13,062.12 (not including the anonymous gift distribution).
- Congregational giving to the General Fund was \$13,713. The monthly budget goal is \$16.880.54.
- Noteworthy Other Giving:
- o Thrivent Choice Program We received another nice donation from Thrivent thanks to church members who have designated their Thrivent Choice dollars to the church.

Some of the noteworthy expenses this month included:

Administration – Various Property Taxes – First half is now due for the church, parsonage, and 2 parking lots. These taxes were up slightly from previous years.

Custodian – No record of work hours was received in April.

Workers Comp – Additional quarterly payment was due.

Mission Outreach — Miscellaneous — Majority of expense (\$31,000) was the distribution of the anonymous gift for missions given back in February. Balance was for a flood bucket.

Pastoral – Interim Pastor Expenses – No expenses reflected due to oversight. Double ex-

pense will be reflected in May.

Health Insurance - Reflects reimbursement to Pastor for his March & April monthly insurance premiums (\$446.68). Balance reflects all other salary and benefit expenses due to his exceeding his 4 weeks of paid vacation. Personal Compensation - Reflects only half of one pay period's expenses due to his exceeding of 4 weeks paid vacation. All other April compensation was offset against the health insurance expense category as he will eventually receive the unused balance.

Worship –Organist – No compensation due to oversight.

Double expense will be reflected in May.

Budget Report

• We ended the month at approximately 4.7% or \$9,600 under budget.

All of the major budgeted expense categories ended under budget for the month.

<u>History of Regular Giving to</u> <u>the General Fund Report</u>

- April's giving was down slightly from March's.
- Looking back since 2011, this was one of the lowest offerings for the month of March.
- March 2021 giving was ahead of March 2020 giving by \$2,300.
- Year-to-date giving is just slightly lower than last year at this time.

This was the lowest year-to-date giving total since 2011.

History of the General Fund Balance

The April balance reflects a slight increase from the March General Fund balance, due to the monthly giving exceeding expenses.

Account Balances Report

- Building Fund Reflects donations made during the month. In addition, it reflects expenses for the separate elevator phone line (\$39.35); the deep cleaning of the church (\$3,000.00); and reimbursement to Nick Walk for video related expenses (\$98.00).
- HS Scholarship Fund Reflects a donation.
- Oil Fund Bldg Upkeep reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.
- Oil Fund Church Emergencies reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.
- Oil Fund Missions reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.
- SS Offering Outreach Fund Reflects the monthly donation of \$38 to Compassion International.

Stained Glass Window Fund – Reflects the purchase of additional sidewalk/street flags (\$594.00).

Brovold Investment Valuation Report

The ending balance has been steady for the past five months and up slightly from last month.

Gunderson Investment Valuation Report

The ending balance decreased slightly from last month.

Other Information

• I completed the State and Federal quarterly withholding tax returns.

I audited the Grace Cemetery Association's 2020 financial records and no concerns were noted.

Jim reported. We received Thrivent Donations again and are very thankful to all those who designated their funds.

Noted: Pastor's section of the financial report looks a bit different this month. This is due to the change in pastor's original requested time off that was required for his stay in Ethiopia. The dollars used were available through the use of the difference in the fringe benefit amount of insurance (as stated in pastor's contract) versus the lessor amount for the insurance policy he has chosen to pay himself. A portion of this dollar difference will offset the cost that resulted due to pastor needing to use more than his four weeks of vacation due to illness. Additional cost for Pastor Mike's service during the extra time taken was also out of this health expense fund. More discussion will result once Pastor Tsena returns because communication is very difficult.

We will need to check on any quarantine issues when pastor gets home.

We are so thankful for Pastor Mike <u>again</u>. What a wonderful friend he is being to Pastor Tsena and Grace!

Dean moved to approve the report. Nick seconded. Motion carried

Pastor Report: Jason reported.

Pastor Mike will not be here the last week in May. Pastor Tsena should be back for service by then. The blessings we have received from Pastor Mike's time with us is unmeasurable!

Committee Reports:

Stewardship: Lori reported. Bobbi updated the bulletin board. It looks wonderful.

Education: Ann reported. Finished Sunday School. Ann was very happy with the attendance results (averages were 25-30 SS students, 7-8 for Confirmation). Need to set dates for VBS. We will wait to set date until Pastor Tsena returns. VBS will have a similar setup as last year in the evenings. Looking at some time in August. Lots of thanks go to Ann and the teachers!

Youth Group: Jim reported. Pastor Tim called and said he had a group of 5 families that would like to do something together with the youth. The proposal is for a shared time at the Sandhill Bible Camp north of Fosston. Pastor Tim would like to know if we want to join them. It is a very nice facility. Jim gave a tentative

YES, but will have to clear this with Pastor Tsena when he returns. Pastor Tim was going to make arrangements and get back to Jim with details. This could be a great opportunity to re-energize our youth interest.

NALCW: Hollie reported. May 13 meeting with Group 2 serving. They are going to have a Mother's Day event that is being planned by Mary. Going to bring in baby items to be donated to the Detroit Lakes Shelter. Format is changing a bit for our meetings. These new events are being offered to regenerate and renew interest. **NOTE*All are welcome and you are welcome to come for any part of the meeting that you can make work. If you can only stay for 15 minutes—That's just fine!

Trustees: Wade reported. Received a bid for the concrete sidewalk that is very reasonable so they are going ahead with the project. When the sidewalk is repaired, it will match up with the street. We will need to retouch our parking lot painting. Hadn't talked to Ryan yet about the furnace project items. Jason will make contact with him. There was a leak in the Food Shelf room and it has been repaired. Skinner roofing has been here to check the roof leak problem. They patched as well as they could. The person who reviewed the roof told us that the roof is basically not repairable and this issue will continue to be a problem. He said that they

would have to come back every year to make repairs, but we have to understand that this will be a continuous problem unless we make a decision regarding a more permanent fix. He will report this information to his manager. Skinner will return information to Wade. Wedges for the front doors did not work so Wade installed the door stops. We thank him for all his extra work. Wade will spray for dandelions on Saturday. Going to order a load of gravel for the handicapped entrance and also for the end of the sidewalk going into the Food Shelf door. Dean has talked to Brian regarding cleaning/ maintenance options. Brian is ok with whatever we need. Ryan will check into the cleaning costs and options if we hire for cleaning more regularly. Mary asked about digging out the bushes that are around the church since they are quite unsightly. Decision has been made to cut the bushes way back to see if they will regrow. Nick reported that the robe closet door insert fell off and needs tabs put back on. Dean will report it to Brian.

Deacons: Gene reported. A pall (a cloth spread over a coffin, hearse, or tomb) has been offered to us by Arlene Bly for use at funerals. Gene is looking for help in finding out how to properly take care of it. We thank Arlene for this donation. Deacons asked if there had been any more plans regarding a Youth Sunday. We need to wait until Pastor returns to make any plans. Deacons are wondering if we should consider

having someone willing to work on some guidelines for helping people present and participate in the digital service in the best way. Example: giving some helps for the most effective microphone use, etc. (Not the technical part of production).

Food Shelf: Gene reported. Thank you to the group who distributed food to 10 families on Thursday. For the month, they served 24 families which is down a bit from 28 average. Total food distributed was 2,073 pounds, which is 700 pounds lower than the average for the previous month. Average food per family was 86 pounds for the month with the average being 94 pounds. Per person amount was 46 pounds while the average was 53 pounds per person. There were four new families added in April with one family having six persons. They are glad to serve more. We are so happy people are willing to come for help. Still storing food at the grocery store. Starting next month with a freezer that is 75% full. Have one pallet over in the parsonage garage which is about 50% full. Total food purchased for April from the NCFB was \$454.00. We received a check today from the NCFB for \$266.00. This was a pass made through donation from the Polk County Corn Growers. Volunteers needed: 2 people for May 12, 5 people needed May 13, 5 people needed for May 20. If you can volunteer let them know.

GRACE COUNCIL, continued Old Business:

Complete Annual Meeting Ballot No movement to date. Still need one Education person. two for the Pioneer Delegates (this involves one meeting per year which is the annual meeting), two for the nominating committee.

Worship COVID guidelines-Nothing has changed at this time. We can worship at capacity with social distancing, we need to continue to wear masks. We will continue to follow the state guidelines. Mask mandate is still in place for indoor gatherings.

Designation of Oil Mission Funds for 2021. We will table this until there is a more substantial amount. As no additional funds have been received no action taken.

New Business:

Review and Discussion -Minkota Mission District Report Jim reported. Basically all information was reported in the Scroll. Met the new Bishop Dan. NALC has grown significantly. Due to this they are going to divide the country into Regions. Not sure at this time where the Minkota district will end up. Centralized office will be moved to Texas. History of The Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was written in August 1892 by the socialist minister Francis Bellamy (1855-1931). It was originally published in *The Youth's Companion* on September 8, 1892. Bellamy had hoped that the pledge would be used by citizens in any country. In its original form it read: "I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible,

with liberty and justice for all."

In 1923, the words, "the Flag of the United States of America" were added. At this time it read: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." In 1954, in response to the Communist threat of the times. President Eisenhower encouraged Congress to add the words "under God," creating the 31-word pledge we say today. Bellamy's daughter objected to this alteration. Today it reads:

"I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Section 4 of the Flag Code states: The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.", should be rendered by standing at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. When not in uniform men should remove any non -religious headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should remain silent, face the flag, and render the military salute." The original Bellamy salute, first described in 1892 by Francis Bellamy, who authored the original Pledge, began with a military salute, and after reciting the words

"to the flag," the arm was extended toward the flag.


At a signal from the Principal the pupils, in ordered ranks, hands to the side, face the Flag. Another signal is given; every pupil gives the flag the military salute right hand lifted, palm downward, to a line with the forehead and close to it. Standing thus, all repeat together, slowly, "I pledge allegiance to my Flag and the Republic for which it stands; one Nation indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for all." At the words, "to my Flag," the right hand is extended gracefully, palm upward, toward the Flag, and remains in this gesture till the end of the affirmation; whereupon all hands immediately drop to the side.

The Youth's Companion, 1892 Shortly thereafter, the pledge was begun with the right hand over the heart, and after reciting "to the Flag," the arm was extended toward the Flag, palm-down. In World War II, the salute too much resembled the Nazi salute, so it was changed to keep the right hand over the heart throughout.
