We want to thank Dean Salveson for removing the snow in front of the aluminum can storage garage. We also want to thank an "unknown" helper for snow removal there

NALCW: Hollie reported. We received a wonderful card from Jolene Bradley. She was so thankful for receiving a card

from us and sent a donation to help purchase more cards and stamps to send to others. We welcome others to help make these cards. Hollie will be at the church on Thursday from 4:30-6:00. She always has cards and stamps available so if you can spare a bit of time stop by and write a card. You do not have to stay the entire time. We are so grateful to Hollie for taking the time to be available for this opportunity to serve.

Trustees: Wade reported. Ryan from SandHill Heating did a pressure test on propane line and it was o.k. We had this checked because our propane use has been high. Ryan also checked a few other minor things and the furnace seems to be running more smoothly. We are still using a lot of propane. Wade did remind us that we have had a very cold winter. This is the coldest winter since 2017. Wade will continue to monitor our usage and check carefully, especially if we continue to use a lot of propane when the temperatures get better. He will call Ryan for further evaluation if that turns out to be the case. Devin Faldet contacted two different architects about the Sunday School roof project and has not received any information from them to date. Wade checked over the snowblower that was discussed last month. It does not need to be replaced. Wade is confident it is in good shape. Gene Haugom is now a Trustee and Ray LaBrecque is our newly elected Trustee.

Deacons: Gary Reported

Gary reflected on the definition of "What exactly is a Deacon?". It is to love one another and care for each other. He is so grateful that we are a loving church family who truly demonstrate a servant's attitude.

Video Tech: Nick reported. No news is good news. Things are running well. Microphone equipment will not arrive in February, so now we are looking at April.

Food Shelf: Gene reported. Thank you Mavis, Gene, Betty, and Judy for working on Food Shelf day. Months totals: served 22 households, 2,020 pounds of food distributed, 91 pounds per family and 57 pounds per person. This month was a bit less than previously, but probably was due to cold and nasty weather. Took in over 700 pounds of food for \$60 from TEFAP. They are SHORT of Help! Please let them know if you can help.

New Business:

Informational - Church Insurance Coverage: Jim reported. He and the Trustees have been reviewing the current insurance coverage. They updated the value of the parsonage to \$325,000. Liability increased to the aggregate total of \$2,000,000. Council liability to \$2,000,000, Sexual Misconduct could not be increased beyond the current \$100,000 because we do not have a written policy in place. Since we currently do not have written policy, we will want to address this issue in the near future. Pastor Counseling liability could not be changed at this time because we do not have a pastor hired. Total premium increased \$350.00 This is still below budget so no action needed to be taken. This purely an informational report from Jim.

Learn What Lent Means to Christians

Gain a deeper understanding of the Lenten season By Mary Fairchild

Lent is the Christian season of spiritual preparation before Easter. In Western churches, it begins on Ash Wednesday. During Lent, many Christians observe a period of fasting, repentance, moderation, self-denial, and spiritual discipline. The purpose of the Lenten season is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ—to consider his suffering and his sacrifice, his life, death, burial, and resurrection.

During the six weeks of self-examination and reflection, Christians who observe Lent typically make a commitment to fast, or to give up something—a habit, like smoking, watching TV, swearing, or a food or drink, such as sweets, chocolate, or coffee. Some Christians also take on a Lenten discipline, like reading the Bible and spending more time in prayer to draw nearer to God.

Strict observers of Lent do not eat meat on Fridays, often opting for fish instead. The goal of these spiritual disciplines is to strengthen the faith of the observer and develop a closer relationship with God.

The Significance of 40 Days

The 40-day period of Lent is based on two episodes of spiritual testing in the Bible: the 40 years of wilderness wanderings by the Israelites after the exodus from Egypt (Numbers 33:38 and Deuteronomy 1:3) and the Temptation of Jesus after he spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11; Mark 1:12-13; Luke 4:1-13).

In the Bible, the number 40 holds special significance in the measurement of time, and many other important events revolve around it. During the flood, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights (Genesis 7:4, 12, 17; 8:6). Moses fasted on the mountain for 40 days and nights before God gave the Ten Commandments (Exodus 24:18; 34:28; Deuteronomy 9). The spies spent 40 days in the land of Canaan (Numbers 13:25; 14:34). The prophet Elijah traveled for 40 days and nights to reach the mountain of God in Sinai (1 Kings 19:8).

Lent in Western Christianity

In Western Christianity, Ash Wednesday marks the first day, or the start of the season of Lent, which begins 40 days prior to Easter (Technically 46, as Sundays are not included in the count). Officially named "Day of Ashes," the exact date changes every year because Easter and its surrounding holidays are movable feasts.

ble feasts.

In the Catholic church, adherents attend mass on Ash Wednesday. The priest distributes ashes by lightly rubbing the sign of the cross with ashes onto the worshippers' foreheads. This tradition is meant to identify the faithful with Jesus Christ. In the Bible, ashes are a symbol of repentance and death. Thus, observing Ash Wednesday at the start of the Lenten season represents one's repentance from sin as well as Jesus Christ's sacrificial death to set followers free from sin and death.

Lent in Eastern Christianity

In Eastern Orthodoxy, the spiritual preparations begin with Great Lent, a 40-day period of self-examination and fasting (including Sundays), which starts on Clean Monday and culminates on Lazarus Saturday. Ash Wednesday is not observed.

Clean Monday falls seven weeks before Easter Sunday. The term "Clean Monday" refers to cleansing from sinful attitudes through the Lenten fast. Lazarus Saturday occurs eight days before Easter Sunday and signifies the end of Great Lent.

Do All Christian Observe Lent?

Not all Christian churches observe Lent. Lent is mostly observed by the Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian and Anglican denominations, and also by


Learn What Lent Means, con't Roman Catholics. Eastern Orthodox churches observe Lent or Great Lent, during the 6 weeks or 40 days preceding Palm Sunday with fasting continuing during the Holy Week of Orthodox Easter.

The Bible does not mention the custom of Lent, however, the practice of repentance and mourning in ashes is found in 2 Samuel 13:19; Esther 4:1; Job 2:8; Daniel 9:3; and Matthew 11:21.

The account of Jesus' death on the cross, or crucifixion, his burial, and his resurrection, or raising from the dead, can be found in the following passages of Scripture: Matthew 27:27-28:8; Mark 15:16-16:19; Luke 23:26-24:35; and John 19:16-20:30.

History of Lent

Early Christians felt the importance of Easter called for special preparations. The first mention of a 40-day period of fasting in preparation for Easter is found in the Canons of Nicaea (AD 325). It is thought that the tradition may have grown from the early church practice of baptismal candidates undergoing a 40day period of fasting in preparation for their baptism at Easter. Eventually, the season evolved into a period of spiritual devotion for the whole church. During the initial centuries, the Lenten fast was very strict but relaxed over time.



Choir History, continued

In the 30's there were Luther League Choirs, that practiced and sang in the Clearwater Circuit Luther League Conventions. A men's choir was organized in the 50's. In the early 40's, Mrs. Ness encouraged the men to join the ladies for an Easter Cantata. They sang, "The Thorn Crowned King." Rev. Onstad was very interested in music and a singer himself and worked to get the mixed choir going. In 1955, Orville Eidem directed this choir, and was followed by Carlin Berg.

Over the years, the choir has been faithfully directed by other faithful leaders, Paul Larson, Myron Johnson, Arnold Tranby, Marjetta Hadler, Kathy Nickelson, Diane Hanson, Dale Branstner, Brad Hagen, Joey Everson, John Berg, Mike Ruse; in 1990, Dale Branstner took over as director of the Grace Choir.
