



Call to Order: President Jason called the meeting to order.

Devotions: Pres. Jason said a prayer for devotions tonight. He prayed for safety and peace, guidance, and wisdom in this difficult times.

Approve Agenda: Motion to approve the amended agenda by Wade. Seconded by Gene. Motion carried.

Secretary's Report: Nick moved to approve February minutes. Seconded by Ann. Motion carried.

Financial Secretary's Report: Dorothy reported.

John moved to approve. Seconded by Hollie. Motion carried. (Report on file).

Treasurer's Report: Jim reported

Cash Flow Report

• Undesignated funds available to be used for February's General Fund expenses totaled \$13,027.49. This amount was

below the month's General Fund expenses totaling \$15,911.42.

- Congregational giving to the General Fund was \$12,168. No church on February 20th lowered the overall giving. The monthly budget goal is \$19,160.69.
- Noteworthy Other Giving:
- o Oil Leases Revenue is down due to the timing of payments.
- o Miscellaneous A \$500 gift from the AFLC parish in McIntosh to help reimburse release time expenses.
- o Thrivent Choice A pass through donation to Grace Cemetery Association.

Some of the noteworthy expenses this month included:

Administration – Church & Parsonage Fuel: Colder temps have continued, so fuel usage is up from past years.

Custodian Salary – Paid three times in February due to timing.

Mission Outreach – Miscellaneous - \$1,706 from Christmas offerings were passed through to the WEM Backpack Program and the WEM Family Service Fund. \$226 was passed through to the Grace Cemetery Association.

Budget Report

- We ended the month at approximately 5.4% or \$12,400 under budget.
- All of the major budgeted expense categories ended under budget for the month, with the exception of Mission Outreach.

• The Miscellaneous line item in the Mission Outreach portion of the budget is way out of budget due to a timing issue. Since a majority of the Christmas Offerings were received in 2021, the 2022 budget does not include those offerings as reimbursed expenses.

The Copyright Fees line item in the Worship portion of the budget is slightly over budget due to an increase in cost.

<u>History of Regular Giving to the</u> <u>General Fund Report</u>

• Looking back since 2011, this was the third highest offering for the month of February.

This is the highest year-to-date giving since 2011!!

<u>History of the General Fund</u> <u>Balance</u>

The February balance reflects a decrease from January's balance due to lower giving (only 3 Sundays) and higher expenses.

Account Balances Report

- Building Fund Reflects donations made during the month and expense for the separate elevator phone line (\$38.66).
- HS Scholarship Fund Reflects a donation and the payout of one scholarship.
- Oil Fund Bldg Upkeep reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.
- Oil Fund Church Emergencies reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.

Other Information

Per the Council's suggestion, Jim purchased a \$25,000 CD from Ultima Bank on March 1, using money from the General Fund.

Jim noted that we had a good month especially considering we didn't have one of the Sundays due to weather.

Pastor's report:

Jason reported that Pastor is so committed and pleased with what has been a very successful Confirmation Class so far.

Looking forward to a very meaningful experience for our young people.

Committee report:

Stewardship: Lori reported. No report but waiting for pictures from Hollie

Education: Ann reported. They received several nice Thank You notes from some of the people who so appreciated receiving valentines from the Sunday School students. \$107 taken in from regular Sunday School offering by our students. An individual donation was also received to be added to the offering for the Ukraine. The Sunday School matched the amount collected. 5th and 6th grade going to the Humane Society later in the spring. They will bring some donations with them.1st Communion preparations will be discussed with pastor after tonight's meeting. A representative from Pathways will be here to talk with our Sunday School students on Sunday.

Youth Group: Ann reported. Trip coming up in March with nine students signed up for Feed My Starving Children.

NALCW: Hollie reported. The Executive Committee met to get the service books completed. Palm Sunday they will be meeting with the Sunday School children to make Easter cards that will be sent out to congregation members. The next meeting will be April 14 at 2:00. Everyone is welcome to come for a Bible Study, dessert, and fellowship.

Trustees: Wade reported. They received a call from an architect but we haven't received any cost

information yet. Wade will follow-up. Called Jack's Electric about getting the noise issue solved with the fan. Wade has been working on the furnace issues with Ryan. Also working to up-to-date Brian on some of the new furnace operations. The key cards that were issued didn't work properly. However, all that has to be done to fix the issue is for the user to notify Kim and she will get the card reprogrammed. Deacons: John reported. They visited the Fosston, McIntosh, and Erskine Assisted Living facilities. They brought a single rose to many of the residents and it was really appreciated by those who received them. They plan to continue this practice in the future. Thank you to John for bringing this us this great idea and making it happen.

Video Tech: Nick reported. No report.

Food Shelf: Gene reported. Last Thursday was a BIG day for the Food Shelf. Thank you to Mavis, Gene, Cheri, and Betty for working a very full day providing service to 17 families. That bring us to 29 families served this month. (6 new families). Distributed 1,255 pounds which brings the total for the month to 2,482 pounds for February. By comparison the Per Family Total for Feb was 85.6 lbs. and the average for last year was 78.5 lbs. Dave Hinkley is resigning as coordinator. We are so thankful to him for his dedicated service. They are in need of many helpers to fill

Welcome Committee: Jason talked to Pastor about a New Members Sunday and plans will be put into place. Please let Jason (or any Council member) know if there is someone that should be contacted about joining our Grace family. We will discuss this further at our retreat on April 2.

Old Business:

Need for a Deacon: We are still short one Deacon. Please prayerfully consider volunteering.

Need for Call Committee: We are in dire need of one more member plus an alternate. Our constitution says that we need 6 regular members and 2 alternates. We want to be able to start by March 24. Jason will announce our needs on Sunday and try to get someone to fill the needs.

Discussion regarding Worship / Covid: We agreed to add the blessing for children back into our communion service.

New Business:

Holy Week / Easter Schedule: 10:30 worship on Easter Sunday. Setting up a 1st Communion: opportunity has been discussed with Pastor Mike. We will formalize a plan. Pastor has been doing some research. He would

like to use one night for teaching and then set a Sunday for 1st Communion. Date to be set after Easter.

Additional General Fund donation for Grace to Ukraine:
Yvonne made a motion to make a \$5,000 donation to the Ukraine that would include: individual member donations, Sunday School donations and the Sunday School match, with the General Fund dollars used to bring the total to \$5,000. Seconded by Wade. Motion carried. (Jason will give a brief update on the Ukraine issue on Sunday)



Our Organs and Organists

Our first church was completed in 1894. But the first organ was only purchased in 1899. The first organist who played in the old church was Gyda Lillemoe. She played into 1908 and was followed by Clara Finsand, and then Mrs. Lind. When our new church was finished, we boasted with a new pipe organ. Two people were needed to operate it the organist plus someone to pump the bellows by way of a long handle. Other organists before the 1934 fire were Vera Cronquest, Julia Finsand, Cora Espeseth, Margaret Ness, Alpha Skogerboe and Mildfre Peterson.

After the interior of the church was gutted by fire, the trustees worked to renovate and refurnish the structure as closely as possible to the original. One change the congregation made was to purchase an electric pipe organ for the cost of \$2000.

The Thief on the Other Cross: A Good Friday Monologue

I don't belong here. I really don't. Paradise is the last place I expected to end up after all I've done. Let me tell you my story.

I am — I was — an armed robber, I guess you'd call it. Me and Jake and the others would live in caves in the Judean hills near the road from Jerusalem to Jericho. We made our living by violence. We wouldn't take on people in the big groups that passed. They traveled together for safety. But a family alone would be an easy mark, as well as anyone fool enough to travel by himself.

Brandishing a strong staff would usually do the trick. Threaten them with a beating and they'd give up without much of a fight. But I've been known to break a few bones in my day, God forgive me. I don't think I actually killed anyone, but then I never stayed around long enough to find out.

The first time I meet Jesus is when I am invited to a party in his honor in Jericho at the home of a rich tax collector named Zacchaeus. I am introduced, we shake hands, and Jesus looks me in the eye for a *long* moment. He can see right into me, who I am, every crime I have ever committed. Then he smiles this big friendly smile. "You know," he says, "there's forgiveness for you

in my Kingdom. How about it?"

I drop my eyes, say something non-committal, and shuffle away. The next day I'm in the crowd, hanging on every word he says. Jesus is talking about his Kingdom, comparing it to a mustard seed, calling it the Kingdom of Heaven. I want so much to go up to him after he has finished and take him up on that forgiveness thing, but I just can't bring myself to do it.

I wish I had. It isn't much later when me and my friend Jake -- the guy on the third cross -- get caught by a Roman patrol. The others run off, but they catch us, beat us silly, drag us into Jerusalem, and throw us in prison. No mercy for the likes of us.

And so it happens that on the same day that they crucify Jesus, they crucify me and Jakenone of us on his left, the other on his right. This isn't any normal crucifixion. Mobs of people are there just because of Jesus. Self-righteous Pharisees are swaggering and mocking. "If you're some kind of messiah," one sneers, "come on down from that cross. If you're a savior, save yourself—if you can!"

Jake begins cat-calling, too, if you can imagine that. I yell over at him, "You miserable thug, don't you have any fear of God? Can't you see that we're going to die just like he is? Show a little decency! We're getting exactly what we deserve, but he ain't

done nothing wrong."

Jake quiets down and the Pharisees lose interest. But I can't get Jericho out of my mind. I can't forget Jesus' eyes, his words, his invitation. And so I call over to him, though it's getting hard to breathe and talking makes it that much harder.

"Jesus!" I say. He turns his head towards me. "Jesus, I was there in Jericho. I met you at a party at Zacchaeus' house. Remember?"

He looks at me for a moment and then nods his head just a little. He *does* remember.

"I never forgot what you said. I wanted to say yes, but just couldn't. And now look at me — look at us!"

He is in bad shape — exhausted, in excruciating pain, back oozing, breath labored. He isn't going to last long. I can see that. But somehow I can see beyond all that. He was the Messiah, is the Messiah, no matter what those priests and Romans and Pharisees have done to him. And when he dies, he will be with God. In a few hours, maybe less, he will be vindicated. He will reign in that Kingdom he told us about.

"Jesus," I call again, quieter now.

He opens his eyes. They are the same eyes, the same piercing, loving, honest eyes.

The Thief on the Other Cross: A Good Friday Monologue, continued


"Jesus," I say, "when you come into your Kingdom, would you remember me?"

His words are labored, his lips parched, but I can still hear him pretty well. "Truly, I say to you...." His voice cracks, then is stronger for a moment. "Truly, this very day you will be with me in Paradise."

His eyes droop. He is fading quickly now. But I believe him. *I do!* That's what gets me through those next few hours until they break my legs to kill me. I *do* believe him!

And then I find myself here in heaven, in Paradise. I sure don't deserve to be here, but here I am anyway. I guess that's what a man like me gets when the King himself grants a pardon. Full forgiveness. Pretty amazing, don't you think?

This story is fictional, of course, though it is based on the account in Luke 23:32-43. The criminals described by the Greek word lestes, "robber, highwayman, bandit." Since Josephus used this as a derisive term to refer to the Zealots, some have thought that it might mean "revolutionary, insurrectionist, guerrilla" here. (lestes, BDAG 594; K.H. Rengstorf, lestes, TDNT 4:257-262). However, in this story I take the thief as a highwayman or bandit, like the one who had robbed the man in Jesus' Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37).
