Treasurer's Report:

Bible Camp – Reimbursement for bible camp tuition.

Miscellaneous – Year-end gifts for Sunday School & Release Time teachers.

Mission Outreach: Miscellaneous - \$60.00 was passed through to the Grace To Ukraine mission; \$2,500.00 was passed through to World Missions; \$587.00 was passed through to Grace Cemetery Association; and \$50.00 was passed through to the Grace Food Shelf.

Budget Report

- We ended the month at approximately 9.9% or \$22,900 under budget.
- All of the major budgeted expense categories ended under budget for the month, with the exception of Mission Outreach due to previously discussed reasons.

<u>History of Regular Giving to</u> the General Fund Report

- Giving is up nicely from last month.
- April giving is the second highest so far in 2022.
- This is the best year-to-date giving since 2018.

This is the third highest year-to-date giving since 2011.

History of the General Fund Balance

• The April balance reflects a nice increase from March's bal-

ance.

• The General Fund balance is the second highest to date in 2022.

The April balance includes the \$25,000 CD.

Account Balances Report

- Building Fund Reflects donations made during the month and expenses for the separate elevator phone line (\$38.66).
- HS Scholarship Fund Reflects a donation.
- Oil Fund Bldg Upkeep reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.
- Oil Fund Church Emergencies reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.
- Oil Fund Missions reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas revenue.

SS Outreach Fund – Reflects a donation as well as the monthly gift of \$38 to Compassion International and a gift of \$196.45 in pet supplies for the Polk County Humane Society.

Brovold Investment Valuation Report

• There was no report for 4/30/22. However, the balance on 5/9 was \$59,354.24.

This is down slightly from March's balance.

Gunderson Investment Valuation Report

The ending balance decreased \$2,000 over last month.

Wade made a motion to approve. Seconded by Nick. Mo-

tion approved.

Pastor's Report: All is going well.

Committee Reports:

Stewardship: Lori reported. Received pictures of quilts made by the Grace ladies from Dorothy and Hollie. Stewardship bulletin board has been updated. Lori got the frame that had been purchased to display the current council members and it has been put up by the elevator. Lori will ask Mary for the picture she took of Andrew receiving recognition for his outstanding service during Covid. She will display that on the Stewardship bulletin board.

Education: Ann reported. The last Sunday of Sunday School went very well. Education committee will meet and discuss this year's program to evaluate what went well, and what they would like to improve. Completed Released Time instruction. Ann put in a special Thank you to Hollie. SS made gift cards for Sunday School and Released Time teachers. The Council wants to acknowledge a big "Thank you!" to Ann for an outstanding job.

Youth Group: No formal report. Ann said they would talk and see if they can plan some kind of an activity this summer, perhaps with the Food Shelf for a shopping day. She will give more information after a decision is made.

NALCW: Hollie reported.

Meeting tomorrow with Group 3 serving. Bible Study with Mary on "Women in the Bible". Activity will be more card making. For the Alexandria meeting that some of the ladies attended, we sent box of Bibles, a box of personal care kits, a box of devotionals, and two Walmart gift cards as donations from our NALCW.

Trustees: Wade reported. Bad news is the sump pump in the parsonage died. Gene picked up another one the next day and all is well. Parsonage got about 4" of water during these last rains. Good news was four people received furnace training from Ryan if the furnace should go down. They should be able to get the furnace going before having to call Sandhill. The tree in front of the parsonage is looking bad and it needs to be addressed. This is especially important when there are cars parked in front of it during funerals or weddings, etc. It will need to be taken down by a professional. Paint has been chosen for the block. It is a dark brown that will match the windows and the metal dark brown trim. Gene indicated that the parsonage garage needs to be cleaned.

Deacons: No report.

Video Tech: Nick reported. The entire sound system has finally arrived! Nick will learn how to install it. Again we say "Thank you" Nick!

Food Shelf: Gene reported.

Committee Reports:

- o Thank you to Mavis, Gene, Betty, Shirley, Myles, and Gerri for working on the 21st!
- o 2,350 pounds were distributed. They provided food for 15 families. The average is 17 so we can expect another big day next week (on the 28th). There were two new families that registered this week. We have 37 families registered for the food shelf and we average about 27 actually shopping each month.
- o \$12,111.07 grant that Dave H. applied for was received. The dollars can be used for a variety of things. They also received another \$500 donation.

Welcome Committee: No report. Talked about down the road having Welcome Packets available for new people.

Call Committee: We are officially posted to the website and our Profile is complete.

Old Business:

Need for a Deacon: No discussion. PLEASE prayerfully consider this. We need someone to serve.

Discussion regarding Worship / Covid: All going well and if we have a large attendance we could have two lines to solve any congestion issues.

Space Study, Food Shelf building, Michael J. Burns Architect

Michael J. Burns Architect, came here on Monday to look at our list of wants/needs for our building. Space in our Education area is priority.

Discussed some options for combining some of our SS rooms to better facilitate our needs with combined classes.

Discussed some of the other issues regarding some wants.

They also discussed some of the code issues that can come up with an old building. Jason found some former plans in the office in regard to past additions and that gave a better picture of what and how the building has been constructed. Also discussed with Burns was our SS roof.

Potential options regarding the Food Shelf's location we discussed.

We are going to get answers to many of the questions, requests, and options that we might have. The committee is dedicated to making an educated decision based solid architectural advice. Burns will now put together some proposals for us. He plans to have them ready for our June meeting if possible.

First Aid Kit: Jason talked to Kim about ordering some. Previously we had talked about getting three fully stocked kits. After discussions with Mary and Wendy, who are medical people, they felt we do not need more than one comprehensive kit that is going to be hung up in a central location. We could still have a small kit in the kitchen with some minor supplies.

GRACE COUNCIL, continued New Business:

Update from the recent Minkota-E. SD Mission District's Convocation in Alexandria. Jim reported. Bishop will be up for reelection next year. We currently have 470 congregations. We have been existence for 12 years. 40-45 pastors are studying at this time. This year about 20-25 pastors will be retiring and only 5 pastors per year are graduating. There is a special track for ordination under special circumstances that does allow for some pastors to speed up their education. NALC is starting a new fund raising campaign to raise \$5,000,000 over the next 3 years. Especially noted is these dollars ARE NOT going to be spent on new facility needs in Dallas. As of May 1 they are going to add another layer of assistance for the Bishop by dividing into 5 regions.

Convocation will be held "in person" in Oklahoma City in August. They held a brief Mission District meeting with South Dakota. They needed to refresh memories on council positions and other business since they had been unable to meet due to Covid.

There is a desire to talk about the shrubs around the church as we are slated to get our block foundation painted when conditions are right. Motion by Nick to remove shrubs on the south and west side of the church, and replace with greenery. Seconded by Lori. Motion carried.

Parish Education

Grace Church continues to support youth for Bible camp, mission trips, and active Release Time, Sunday School, and VBS programs.

Sunday School—Recognizing the need for the Christian education of their youth, the founders of the congregation began a Sunday School in 1892 with T.S. Langhie as Sunday School Superintendent. In the early 1900's, they held parochial school for 21/2 - 3 months every summer. This was held in Knute Town Hall, Oppegaard School, and in town. Sunday School was also held in the home of Martin Benson for several years. The present Sunday School addition was dedication in December 1961.

Greetings in Christ:

We are pleased to report that over 50 Christian churches, plus individuals, businesses and schools, participated in packing 280,000 meals for hungry children March 25-26 in the Grand Forks Minnkota Building—enough to feed 768 kids for one whole year.

We want to thank you for your support, your prayers, your volunteers and your funding that made this effort possible. In addition, volunteers brought supplies for a food pantry.

The bulk of the meals were shipped to Christian distribution organizations in Haiti (101,000) and Honduras (163,300) with some (17,800) in the Eagan FMSC warehouse for later crises.

The 2022 packing brought the total for the last 11 packings to 3,880,000 meals and \$934,000. Looking back, this has been an incredible record for the Christians in our region.

Because of the enthusiastic support in Northeast North Dakota and Northwest Minnesota, we are planning another packing of 282,000 on March 25-26, 2023.

If your church has not been an active participant in the past, we invite you to be a partner in this mission work. By planning your church's support early, it would be possible to make it an all-

Church event through the church budgeting or special fund-raising.

It has been a privilege for us to provide this opportunity to serve Christ side-by-side with other Christian denominations.
