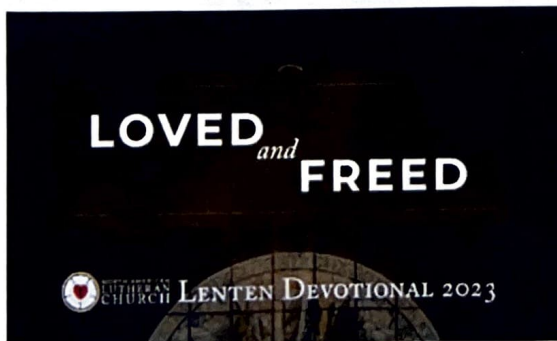

Call to Order: President Jason called the meeting to order.

Devotions: Pastor Pam lead us in devotions. Psalm 112. Blessings are contingent upon honoring God. Verse 1 says God tells us "Blessed is the one who fears the Lord." Respect, reverence. We feel the love of God and want to align our lives with the commandments. It's only in God that we cannot be afraid because He casts out our fear. We need to serve generously without worrying about what we get in return. There is always more we can do.

Jason addressed us regarding a minor change in Parliamentary Procedure. We will change the wording in dealing with our monthly reports. The Agenda Approval and Secretary's Report will continue to need a "motion to approve" since there can be changes made to them at the meeting. The rest of the reports will be use a "motion to receive".

Approve Agenda: Motion to approve the amended agenda by Gene. Seconded by Nick.

Motion carried.

Secretary's Report: Gary moved to approve the October minutes. Seconded by Lori. Motion carried.

Financial Secretary's Report: Dorothy reported.

Hollie moved to receive the report. Seconded by Gene. Motion carried. (Report on file).

Treasurer's Report: Jim Reported

Cash Flow Report

Undesignated funds available to be used for January's General Fund expenses totaled \$15,429.70. This amount was above the month's General Fund expenses totaling \$12,712.62. Congregational giving to the General Fund was \$14,911.03. The monthly budget goal is \$20,221.69.

Noteworthy Other Giving: Miscellaneous – Primarily consists of a Workers Comp Insurance refund of \$279, a \$50 donation to the Grace Food Shelf, and a \$50 donation to the Grace Youth Group. Thrivent Choice Program – Donation of \$140.00 was received through this program.

Some of the noteworthy expenses this month included:

Administration: Church & Parsonage Fuel – The propane tank was filled up only once in January (650 gallons).

Miscellaneous – Pass through additional donations to ICCC from Xmas offerings, to the Grace Food Shelf, and to the Grace Youth Group.

Pastoral: Miscellaneous – Mileage to Pastor Lyle Belleque for Pastor Pam's installation.

Worship: Worship Aids – Communion Wine (\$174.00), Absolution Cup (\$48.00), and worship

Miscellaneous – Pass through additional donations to ICCC from Xmas offerings, to the Grace Food Shelf, and to the Grace Youth Group.

Pastoral: Miscellaneous – Mileage to Pastor Lyle Belleque for Pastor Pam's installation.

Worship: Worship Aids – Communion Wine (\$174.00), Absolution Cup (\$48.00), and worship music (\$98.48)

Budget Report

We ended the month at approximately 3% or \$7,900 under budget.

All of the major budgeted expense categories ended under budget for the month.

History of Regular Giving to the General Fund Report

Giving started out nicely for the year.

However, it is lower than January 2022.

In comparison to giving for January in other years, this is the fourth highest since 2011.

History of the General Fund Balance

The General Fund balance is up nicely from year-end 2022.

The January balance includes the \$25,000 CD plus interest.

Account Balances Report

Building Fund - Reflects regular donations made during the month (\$20.00). It also reflects expenses related to the separate elevator phone line (\$39.15) and an inducer motor for the parsonage (\$324.48). **HS Scholarship Fund –** Reflects a donation (\$25.00) and the payout of a scholarship (\$300.00).

Oil Fund – Bldg Upkeep reflects a portion of this month's oil/gas

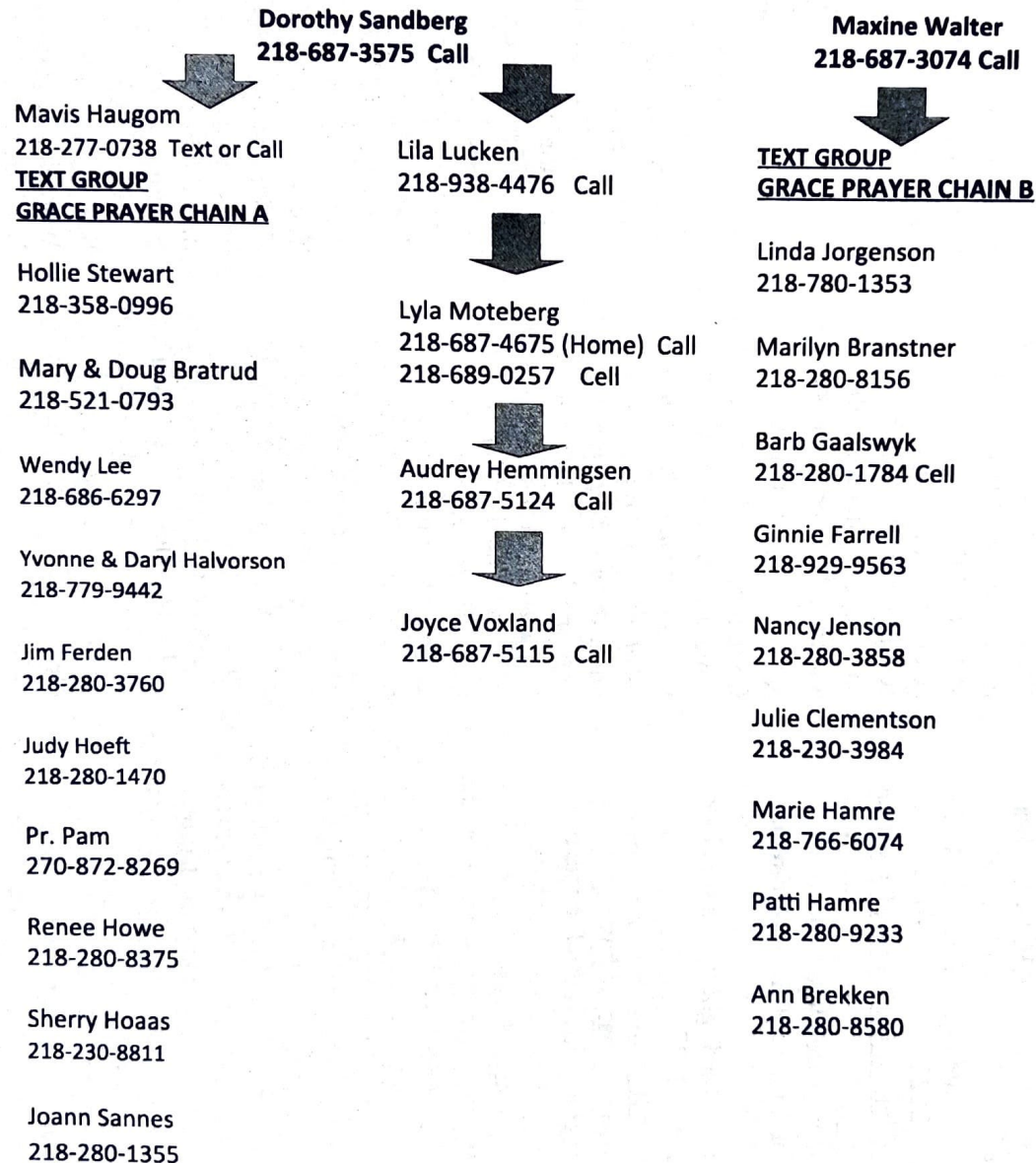

Other Information

During January, I have been working with Hahn Financial Group, Inc. to begin making payments to Pastor Pam’s retirement account. However, due to various circumstances, they have not gotten the account established yet for me to start making retirement contributions to her account.

The General Fund CD matures on March 1. I want to have discussion with the Trustees and the Council as to their thoughts of renewing the CD or not.

Jim welcomed Paul M. as the new trustee. Motion to receive the report by Nick. Gary seconded. Motion carried.

Pastor’s Report: Pastor Pam reported.

Pastoral Care: Visitation I visited

several ladies at McIntosh Senior Living with Gene Haugom. I provided individual communion service for each. I met several of the staff. At invitation from Nancy Jenson, I had coffee one afternoon with several ladies at Pioneer. I attended to the family of Everett Osland in his last days after which there was a memorial service.

Nursing Home plans: On Friday, Feb. 10th I begin rotation at Fair Meadow in Fertile with a communion service. I have arranged for regular communion worship services at Pioneer. Time slot to be determined. I need a piano accompanist. It would be nice to have several Grace members to attend and be part of the service.

NALC: I attended the Pastor’s Conference in San Antonio. The topic was the most relevant one yet, *Reclaiming Christian Anthropology: Gender Ideology and Our Pastoral Response*. Our keynote speaker was Dr. John S. Grabowski, Ordinary Professor of Moral Theology and Ethics, Catholic University of America and author of the recent book, *Unraveling Gender*.

The videos are posted at the-nalc.org/pastors-conference-2023/ Watch them. Watch Bishop Dan Selbo’s sermon, too. I have known Bishop Dan for several years. He was a fellow Dean with Pastor Tim and me. Lutheran Week is August 7, 2023 – August 11, 2023 in Oklahoma City. Pastor Brad Hales is on staff of the NALC for Renewal Ministries. His area is to help the church change mindset. Instead of lamenting the “aging of the

church,” we need to embrace it and help older adults grow in their discipleship of Jesus. Through “second half ministry” a congregation can be renewed and “re-fired” for mission. Join us on the first Tuesday of each month at 11 AM EST for a free webinar beginning February 6th. On the third Tuesday of each month at 8 PM EST, we will be offering a brief word of encouragement and “power up” via Facebook Live.

I'd like to discuss Holy Communion practices and a possible returning to using the rail. I will begin Altar Guild training as soon as we can gather.

First Communion will be Sunday March 26 or April 16. Classes are 5 weeks with a culmination of baking communion bread for the Sunday. Dates and times to be set. Confirmation is going well. New materials have arrived to supplement what Pastor Tsena ordered. These are from Sola Publishing which is a solid resource endorsed by the NALC and LCMC.

Deacons: Many thanks to Gary Walters and John Carlson for all that they have taken on in the absence of a pastor. Their ministry will continue in some form. I am formulating the guidelines for Deacons considering what has been done in the past, what is currently happening, and what duties will then be assigned to Deacons. I would like to hear from those who have served in the past as well as what other churches have done. We will then set forth guidelines. Until then, I would like to wait on recruiting another Deacon.

Jason indicated that there are 12 people now willing to help with Alter Guild.

Gary made the motion to receive the report. Seconded by Gene. Motion carried.

Committee Reports:

Stewardship: Lori reported. No report. Pastor Pam did get some materials to share with them.

Education: Ann reported. No special events. 1st Communion has nine students in grades 3-7. Received "Feed My Starving Children" information from Jim. Ann will get the information out to the youth. Deadline is next week. Jason added that we have an open invitation to the event in Fargo, should we need.

Youth Group: Jim reported. He has been involved in the planning and conversation regarding "Feed My Starving Children" and getting registered for the event in Grand Forks. Participants are typically Youth Group age, but can be younger if interest is expressed.

NALCW: Hollie reported. Hope Circle treasurer is changing from Betty Lundin to Joann Sannes. Cards will be made and sent out to the prayer list people again this month. March 9 will be the start-up of regular meetings again. If you know any women in the church that did not get the WNALC book please let Hollie know.

Trustees: Gene reported. Paul Mahlen is a new member so we welcome him. Vassa is moving and told us that she could no longer clean for us. She told Gene that her mom would be willing to take over the position. The trustees will contact her. Furnace is installed and working in the parsonage. A few things still need to be completed, but all is well.

Duct work cleaning has been completed in the parsonage. The baseboards in the Sunday School wing need to be replaced. Trustees are looking into this. Gene took the wheels off the pulpit so it is now lower. Gene put the 3rd railing up again.

Deacons: Gary reported. Did the normal visitations. Provided rides for people and did service related tasks.

Video Tech: Nick reported. Had a bit of sound trouble with our programming. Nick worked with Garden Valley to correct it. Nick learned to do a picture within a picture. This gives us a great new option. Nick went through the old computer that was in the parsonage and took the data off it. Will need to decide what to do with the info. Computer is VERY old and will need to be disposed of.

Food Shelf: Gene reported. (Report prepared by Mavis Haugum) January 2023 stats for Grace Community Food Shelf. We served 33 households (the most in a long time). We had 15 children, 37 adults between 18-64 and 17 people over 65. We carted out 2042.6 pounds of food this month. We had some new people that have never been at the food shelf before. However, everyone had to re-up for the coming year, so everyone was considered a new visit. Down on inventory so Gene and Mavis went shopping to get more food. The after-hours time seems to be working out well. They assume that come summer it will continue to improve.

FROM THE PASTOR, continued**And now for some humor**

We have a new liturgy found in our Blue Book – setting 5. I know you're so gracious in learning it. I hope you all enjoy it. But you might want to see what happened when only a new hymn was introduced in South Dakota!

Hundreds were hospitalized and scores more traumatized for life in the wake of a disastrous hymn roll-out this past Sunday. Recklessly acting in a way contrary to all Lutheran sensibilities, Pastor Norman Schroeder inserted a previously unsung hymn, "Through Jesus' Blood and Merit," into the church service.

"I remember paging to hymn 372 and thinking that it looked unfamiliar," said helpless victim Delores Hamilton from her hospital bed. "My heart started pounding in my chest! My vision narrowed! As we started singing my hands trembled uncontrollably. I felt lightheaded! I don't even think I made it through the first stanza before I passed out."

First responders were overwhelmed by the chaotic scene. Ambulances struggled to make their way through the terrified mob streaming through the church parking lot. Inside the sanctuary, hundreds were incapacitated, many still frozen with their hands clutched over their ears in a vain attempt to shut out the unfamiliar tune. The few conscious congregants were in such a weakened state they were unable to assist their more gravely injured Lutherans.

"We haven't seen such a tragedy since the Reformed Church tried to introduce a contemporary version of the Song of Simeon," lamented local Police Chief Richard Johnson. "Thank goodness there was no loss of life. If we hadn't tasered the organist, the death toll would have been truly catastrophic."

The investigation is only beginning, but already red warning lights are flashing in the eyes of any commonsense Lutheran. Why didn't Pastor Schroeder run his plans through the worship committee? Why wasn't the hymn tune introduced as postlude, prelude, and offertory? Why weren't congregants warned the standard three months in advance that a new hymn was being introduced? Only a fair, impartial investigation and the immediate excommunication of Pastor Schroeder can ensure such a tragedy never occurs again.

Old Business:

Need for a Deacon: We will pause on this until Pastor Pam completes the Deacon's job description.

New Business:

Lenten Schedule: Pastor wanted to know what we normally do. Traditionally, we have Lenten services on Wednesday evenings, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

Council Retreat: Saturday morning April 22. Coffee at 8:30. Meeting begins at 9:00. Full committees are invited, not just the Council. Pastor would like a participatory Bible Study included at the Retreat.

Discuss General Fund: \$25,000 CD that is maturing. Interest rates have improved. Currently 4% at Ultima Bank for a 1 year CD. Trustees thought this would a good option. The Council agreed. Jim will move forward with this plan.

Oil Lease: research report by Gary. Gary received a letter regarding oil track research that would cost us \$345. This research would find out which tracks Annie owned and if we have been unaware of any others. If we get that information, we can make a claim to those mineral rights be-

cause then we could prove ownership. The Council agreed to approve having the research done.

YouTube request: Decision was made not to support it.

Announcements:

Received a thank you note from the Inter-County Community Council for of our donation for Hotel Vouchers. They were very appreciative.


Received a letter from *Grace to the Ukraine* acknowledging our gift of \$6,267.00.
