



Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent. We will have services with imposition of ashes at Noon and 7 PM. Soup supper will precede at 6 PM.

Lent is a time of reflection and soul searching meant to reflect on the sacrifice of Jesus. It has been a time of preparation for Easter since the earliest days of the church and a preparation for Holy Baptism. Lent is observed as 40 days beginning on Ash Wednesday and ending on Maundy Thursday. In the Western Church, Sunday is a day of the Resurrection, therefore we skip Sundays in the calculation of the length of Lent. We use purple in worship suggesting somberness and solemnity.

The forty days of Lent recall the 40 day fast of Jesus in the wilderness after his baptism (Matthew 4:2, Luke 4:1-2) and Moses' 40 day fast on Mount Sinai (Exodus 34:28). It is a time of simplicity and preparation.

Lent is our time of Spiritual Renewal and Preparation for the Joy of Easter

In this season we take time to reflect on our lives and to focus on God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Prayer, Bible Study, Repentance (yes, confession), and right living. An ancient part of Christian discipline is also **Fasting**. Not fasting for health of the body, but for one's inner spiritual self. Fasting is Biblical.

Fasting is the spiritual discipline of intentionally going without something for a time to focus on your relationship with God. Even Jesus fasted for 40 days before beginning His ministry (Mark 2:18-19 NIV).

Make Sure That You Have Time To Pray.

It will not do you any spiritual good if don't pray. Be sure to get the most out of your fast and spend plenty of time in prayer, consider setting a few days for a retreat to totally fast and pray. Sometimes prayer is more difficult during fasting, but be diligent and you will find breakthrough. **Hebrews 11:6** *And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.* God will reward your seeking.

Types of Fasting

In the same way that God appointed times and seasons to fast, He also designated several types of fasts. A person should exercise wisdom and consult their physician if they have any medical concerns before they fast.

1. **Complete Fast**— An absolute fast is conducted by abstaining from all food and water for a certain period of time. Moses and Elijah both abstained from food and water for forty days and forty nights. (Deuteronomy 9:9, 10:10, 18:25-29; 1 Kings 19:8). Some do 3-4, 14, or 21 day fasts or 1 day a week.

2. **Solid Food Fast**—A solid food fast is where an individual may drink juice and water, but chooses not to eat solid food.

3. **Partial Fast (Daniel)** —To fast simply means to "abstain" from something. A partial fast is where you choose to abstain

Cash Flow Report

Regular Offering to the General Operating Fund was \$16,166.85. Undesignated funds available to be used for December's General Fund expenses totaled \$39,288.97. This total is comprised of the regular offering, a significant anonymous gift (\$18,519.00), interest, undesignated memorials, and various other giving that can be used to meet General Fund expenses. The total of undesignated funds

received was well above (\$10,750.18) the month's General Fund expenses of \$28,538.79. These expenses were also well above the normal monthly expenses.

History of Regular Giving to the General Fund Report

Giving in December was down from giving in November. It was the seventh highest giving in 2025.

This was the fifth best giving in any December since I have tracked giving.

Total giving for the year is approximately \$16,000 ahead of last year's giving.

Total giving is also the best giving for any year at this time.

History of the General Operating Fund Balance

Expenses were much higher in December. Without the significant anonymous gift in December, the General Fund balance would have been negative again.

Brovold Investment Valuation Report

The large increase in the balance is mainly due to the redeposit of a \$5,000 check to the Grace Cemetery Association that was not deposited within 6 months.

This is the highest balance since September 2024.

Gunderson Investment Valuation Report

The balance increased by approximately \$900.00 from last month.

This is the highest balance since September 2025.

2026 Church Budget – After reviewing year-end expenses, I made a couple of adjustments to

2026 Church Budget – After reviewing year-end expenses, I made a couple of adjustments to the budget that was approved last month. I adjusted Brian's hours from 200 to 215, which increased the Custodian expense item slightly. I also adjusted Pastor's miles from 3,600 to 3,900 and considered the 2026 IRS mileage rate (\$0.725); which increased the travel expense slightly. The total budget increased from \$261,965.43 to \$262,656.28. The 2025 budget was \$264,925.21.

Worker Compensation Audit – I have received the results of the audit. The auditor determined that we receive a refund of \$424 on our insurance premium.



PRAYER AND FASTING, continued

Types of Fasting

In the same way that God appointed times and seasons to fast, He also designated several types of fasts. A person should exercise wisdom and consult their physician if they have any medical concerns before they fast.

1. Complete Fast— An absolute fast is conducted by abstaining from all food and water for a certain period of time. Moses and Elijah both abstained from food and water for forty days and forty nights. (Deuteronomy 9:9, 10:10, 18:25-29; 1 Kings 19:8). Some do 3-4, 14, or 21 day fasts or 1 day a week.

2. Solid Food Fast—A solid food fast is where an individual may drink juice and water, but chooses not to eat solid food.

3. Partial Fast (Daniel) —To fast simply means to “abstain” from something. A partial fast is where you choose to abstain from certain foods and drinks instead of complete abstinence of food or drink. Some give up meat. The Bible tells us that Daniel abstained from bread, water, and wine for twenty-one days (Daniel 10:3). Afterwards, he and his faithful friends ate healthy.

FUEL Fasting (Navigators)

1. F – Food

Practice: Do you ever use food as a comfort when you’re sad or as a reward when you’re happy? Try fasting from one type of food or even one meal a day for a certain period of time and see how your cravings change. How does this require deeper depend-

ence on the Lord?

Ponder: What can you learn from Daniel as he fasted from certain types of food (Daniel 1:8-16 NIV)?

Pray: Father, deepen my hunger and thirst for you.

2. U – Use Of Time

Practice: How often do you describe your day as “busy?” How does your schedule make you feel? What fills most of your time?

Take inventory of your time by writing down everything you do for a week. Then ask God to show you what activities you could fast from to commit to time for Him.

Ponder: Learn from Nehemiah as he fasted and prayed after hearing about the destruction of the city walls of Jerusalem. He was willing to offer whatever time necessary to help (Nehemiah 1:4 NIV).

Pray: Father, teach me how to best honor you with how I spend my time.

3. E – Entertainment

Practice: How does it feel to have someone like your post or have someone unfollow you on social media? How are your entertainment choices influencing you?

Talk with the Lord about what you watch and listen to—music, movies, TV, social media, podcasts, etc. Decide how you might fast from entertainment.

Ponder: Learn from the early church how fasting and prayer coincided with worship. This led them to commission more believers to go and share the gospel (Acts 13:2-3 NIV).

Pray: Father, make me more aware of who you are and therefore increase my worship.

FUEL Fasting (Navigators)


4. L – Listen To

Practice: Who do you look to for encouragement? Does someone’s approval matter most? Whose voice is the loudest in your life?

Try fasting from noise and use it as an opportunity to embrace silence and more clearly hear God’s voice.

Ponder: Learn from the churches in Galatia (Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch) as Paul and Barnabas used prayer and fasting to make leadership decisions (Acts 14:21-23 NIV). In Paul’s letter to the Galatians he emphasized the importance of God’s approval (Galatians 1:10 NIV).

Pray: Father, transform me to desire your approval above all others.



A rugged cross is set in the sanctuary during Lent where all are invited to come for contemplation and to pray. You may include prayer concerns, confessions, and needs attaching them to the cross. Jesus came to set us free and this he did by giving himself for us, to take our burdens upon himself on the cross. His blood is powerful. His blood is healing.

Holy Communion Study

1st Communion Instruction

Jesus gave us this meal on the night before he was crucified. It is important to understand why we celebrate Holy Communion.

- What is the meaning and purpose of the Sacrament of Holy Communion?
- In what way do we receive God's grace?

Study begins for youth and adults who are preparing to receive Holy Communion.

February 22 – March on Sundays during the Education Hour – 9:15. Parents/Sponsors should attend the first one if possible and meet with Pastor.

Age of First Communion varies within our Lutheran tradition. In general, we do Communion recognition and awareness at about age 9 or 10 which is about 4th or 5th grade. How do we know that someone is ready? Generally, we ask that children express an interest in receiving the sacrament and that they are able to sit through and participate in the worship service before receiving Communion for the first time.

Pastor Pam will lead a 5-week course for **children** who are considering preparation to receive Holy Communion. Materials are available. The Saturday before the First Communion Service, the class will bake the bread for the Sacrament.

Adults who desire to know more about Holy Communion may see Pastor Pam and we'll set up a regular time to study. Materials are available.
